# Advancing Into the Future: ETI's Year of Transformation

Happy Holidays Everyone!

It has been a year of many changes at the ETI.

Take a look at what we have accomplished already and what is soon to come in 2024.

After a four year hiatus, the Western Electrical Cyber-Security Apprenticeship Training (WECAT) has had the latest version of the California Advanced Lighting Controls Training Program (CALCTP) implemented and utilized in classroom instruction.

We recently held a Journey-level class on the Commerce campus which was attended by four of the five instructors who took part in the growth from its beta stages to full implementation.

The WECAT class was created in partnership with UC Davis and will be made available to all 5-2 Inside Wireman Apprentices in 2024, as well as Journey-level members.







In addition to the WECAT updates, we recently received a dual-purpose Cyber-Security and Smart Building Energy Management Systems curriculum and lab from UC Davis.

In the first quarter of 2024, this class curriculum and accompanying lab will be finalized by ETI Staff, and will be made available to all 5-2 Inside Wireman Apprentices in 2024, as well as Journey-level members.



# Shining Bright: ETI's Ongoing Upgrades and Industry Partnerships



If you have recently taken a stroll through the ETI warehouse, you will likely have noticed substantial changes! Out of date material and labs have been retired and cleared out to make ample space for the new labs on the way.

The High Voltage Cable Splicing labs have undergone significant upgrades. The fencing that surrounded the lab has been removed, the switchgear has been relocated from the middle of the area to the book cage fence line, and a dozen new splicing stations have been built. This is only Phase One of the transformation that area is undergoing!



Additionally, lighting throughout the warehouse has been upgraded. The warehouse is now three times brighter than it was previously!

We are doing all that we can to create a world-class facility and we are literally shining a light on it.

We have become an extremely popular facilitating location for many industry partners, such as the Los Angeles Federation of Labor (who have their monthly meeting at our facility). It brings us joy to be able to facilitate their event in a much brighter space this month!

In the coming weeks, we will continue our progress by clearing and reorganizing the facilities back-of-house space, as well as our book cage.

## Stay Safe This Season: Understanding Wildfire Smoke Risks

As we approach the winter season in Los Angeles County, it's important to remain vigilant about wildfire safety, especially during occasional dry and windy spells that can still occur in December.



#### What You Need to Know

Most outdoor workers are affected by wildfire smoke regulations, but there are some exceptions. You're covered unless you work in a fully enclosed and air-filtered building or vehicle, or if your exposure to heavy smoke is very short (less than one hour during your shift). This rule also doesn't apply to firefighters fighting wildfires.

#### **Staying Informed and Protected**

Understanding and monitoring the air quality is key. The Air Quality Index, or AQI, measures how polluted the air is. You can easily check this using free resources like the U.S. EPA Air Now and the California Air Resources Board websites, or by downloading the EPA's Air Quality app on your phone. The AQI is now included in the default weather app for iPhone.

When the air gets too smoky, as in the AQI for small particles in the air (PM 2.5) goes over 150 – it's time to take action. Employers might change work schedules, reduce how hard you work, or even stop outdoor work for a while. If you have to work outside when the AQI is high, you should have access to special masks like N95 respirators to help protect your lungs.

If the AQI goes above 500, which is rare but very dangerous, using a mask becomes a must to keep you safe while working outside.

Remember, your health is your top priority. Keeping an eye on air quality and knowing what steps to take during high-smoke days can help protect you during wildfire season.

We're excited to announce that come January 2024, the Electrical Training Institute will reopen its application process, and we invite our apprentices to spread the word. Our new, streamlined process is not just about making strides in equity and accessibility but also to address unanticipated challenges that resulted from the increased interest from members of the community looking to join our program.

The change to this process did not come about lightly. With our previous process, all applications had to be reviewed by members of the ETI staff. While this may seem like a minor concern, some quick math tells a different story. In 2015, we began to see large increases in the number of apprenticeship applications we received. In the year 2019 alone, we had nearly 8,500 people apply to join our programs. In each of these instances, staff is required to physically review ALL applicant paperwork, schedule ALL qualified applicants for the entrance exam, and schedule and conduct interviews for those candidates that passed the entrance exam. From January 2019 through July 2023, we received (and had to process) nearly 30,000 applications. This stretched our resources beyond our organizational limits, which consequently impacted our ability to process applicants in what we feel is a timely manner. In addition, applicants were also required to visit our campus on three different instances to work through the application process.

The changes being implemented in 2024 are aimed at relieving these issues. Moving forward, applicants will only have to report physically to the ETI campus one time instead of the three separate trips required previously. We also anticipate that the changes being made will significantly decrease wait times for applicants.

To ensure transparency, we will be adding a new FAQ page to the Information for Applicants tab of the ETI website. Members and applicants can stay informed by regularly visiting the ETI website for the most accurate information.

We hope you have a wonderful holiday season and we look forward to continuing to maximizing resources to improve the member experience at the ETI.

I'm happy to report that since the last newsletter, our EMPOWER meetings have been everything I'd hoped they would be, and more. They have been informative, fun, bonding, and given our EMPOWER members opportunities to meet leaders who could have a positive and impactful influence on their lives.

October brought us IBEW Business Representative and Safety Officer Mike Costigan and IBEW/ NECA Director of Safety Allen Sloan who spoke to the importance of and need for PPE designed for women's body types.

This discussion set the stage for our November guest, Kelly Franco, the entrepreneur behind Seraphina Women's Safety Apparel. Kelly is an innovative spirit and she shared stories about her groundbreaking creations, like FR-rated bras for women. She showed us an eye opening video where a mannequin under test wearing a 20 cal suit was put under an 18 cal arc flash event. The mannequin was wearing a regular bra, and even though the outerwear was rated for the event, the undergarment melted and fused to the mannequin. Kelly also shared some of the challenges of designing clothing for women, answering our questions with great detail, and left us all inspired by her passion. We ended the year on a high note in December with our most substantial Grand Raffle yet. Thanks to the Equal Representation in Construction Apprenticeship (ERiCA) grant, whose mission is to create career pathways for women, non-binary and underserved populations into careers in the building and construction sectors, two lucky winners received an Inside Wireman Klein tool kit. Milwaukee also generously donated to the raffle with a cooler, tumblers, and ball caps. Hand made soaps and a coloring book promoting diversity in the trades were also raffle prizes. December's meeting shared a documentary video from the Tradeswomen Archives of Neshtey Crudup, the first black woman to journey out in our local. It was inspiring to see her climb the ranks when she started her apprenticeship in the early 1980s. We women stand on her shoulders and follow the trail that she blazed.

EMPOWER meetings are filled with learning, sharing, mentoring, inspiration, and more, to assist in Local 11's ongoing efforts to recruit and support women.

As we turn the page on another successful quarter, we look forward to continuing this journey of empowerment, learning, and growth with each of you.

This year, we heard from leaders like Nancy Pelosi and Liz Shuler. They emphasized how crucial it is for union members to get involved, especially in voting, to make our voices heard in important decisions.

#### How is our homework graded?


